

Expatriates have been playing a central role in International Business, at the neglect of host country nationals (HCNs), the local employees in multinational corporations' (MNC) foreign subsidiaries. This panel shifts the attention from expatriates to HCNs who, despite being central actors in the MNC, are often treated as subordinated to expatriates in both research and practice. The panel consists of two parts — a coordinated presentation by two panelists and an interactive discussion with the symposium participants. The panel will outline the historical development of research on HCNs and raise research questions based on the current state of research regarding HCNs, for example, HCNs as knowledge agents and the interactions between expatriates and HCNs. The panel is relevant as it addresses issues related to the majority of MNC employees (HCNs constitute more than 80% of the MNC workforce globally) in a context determined by increasing barriers to global mobility, making HCNs even more vital for MNCs' operations and success.
